CAMRA HELPS PREVENT A CHILLY RECEPTION AT A CASK MARQUE PUB





The Cask Marque quality scheme for pubs, which is sponsoring the Good Beer Guide for the next three years, was set up to ensure

the highest quality possible for cask conditioned beer.

However, there has been a lot of criticism from *CAMRA* members that although accreditation is not available to licensees who serve beer above 60°F, there was no lower limit specified. Extra cold serving temperatures can mask a range of quality issues as well as taking away all the subtle flavours and aroma which make cask beer so special.

Now, following a year of discussion with *CAMRA*National Chairman, Dave Goodwin, *Cask Marque* has agreed a minimum of 50°F, allowing its team of assessors more discretion to give a truer reflection of the character of the beers served.

Cask Marque director Paul Nunny said "Ideally, cask ale should be served at cellar temperature, or 53-56°F. Originally Cask Marque identified temperatures over

60°F as the major issue. But serving cask beer too cold can also have a damaging effect. Now there is equipment in cellars to give the licensee complete control over temperature, so there is no excuse for cask ale to be too warm or too cold."

Dave Goodwin said "While we always welcomed the *Cask Marque* initiative, we couldn't support it as actively as we wanted until this issue was resolved."





Local News

AYLESBURY

The Whistlin Duck has had an extra handpump installed. Until they build up the real ale trade, they are serving using one at a time with the other cleaned and ready to serve when the first has run out. The beers served recently have been Charles Wells Bombardier, Wadworth 6X, Morland's Old Speckled Hen, Theakston's Old Peculier, Courage Directors and Ruddles County.

CADMORE END

The Old Ship has gone into Dry Dock! It closed on 14th January so that internal work can be carried out to increase the size of the bar and to conform with safety requirements. The work is expected to take six to eight weeks to be completed.

EMMINGTON

The Inn at Emmington has a new owner and is currently serving Adnam's Bitter and Broadside.

FORD

The Dinton Hermit is now back in business. When visited, the pub seemed to be thriving with the experienced hand of Johnny Chick at the helm. There were plenty of

people enjoying lunch and the main impression is that it now seems more of a restaurant than a pub. The wall between the original two bars has been removed but, unlike many other examples, this has enhanced the pub interior.

There was a blazing log fire and good standard of decor which created a pleasant atmosphere. Behind the bar there are some dummy barrel ends from which the real ale is drawn. The Morrell's Advent, which was on draught, was dispensed by 'Flojet' a method approved of by CAMRA.

Johnny's policy on real ale is to stick to one beer for the time being although different beers will be tried. Perhaps additional beers will be added later if sales increase.

Johnny's father in law, Dick Williams, sometimes helps in the bar. Dick ran the Whip at Lacey Green for many years and was active in the local branch of CAMRA in the 1970s.

GAWCOTT

The Cuckoo's Nest has been voted Buckinghamshire Real fire Pub of the Year, in a competition jointly organised by the Solid Fuel Association and the Coal

Merchants Federation.

They received a certificate, a cheque for £200, and half a tonne of free fuel.

HIGH WYCOMBE

Eldridge Pope have applied to turn the old Parker Knoll building in Frogmore into a pub. Further details will follow when available.

A small sample of pubs reveals the great variety of traditional beers now available around the Wycombe area.

The Swan at West Wycombe has Brakspear's Ordinary and Special plus Rebellion IPA.

Roy Gibson, landlord since August 1999 at the Jolly Bodger on Chairborough Road, has just added Brakspear's Bitter to his ever popular Fuller's London Pride. Roy's guest beers during the last year include Coniston Blackbird, Moles Best Bitter, Oakhill Bitter, Ridley's IPA, Jennings Bitter. Black Sheep Bitter, Bateman's XB and Brain's Dark mild.

In mid January, the Rose & Crown on Desborough Road had Bass, Courage BB. Wells Bombadier, Brakspear's Bitter and Young's Special - five beers from

five different breweries, what used to be called a mini beer festival.

LACEY GREEN

Richard and Karen Pither have taken over as the new landlords at the Pink & Lily.

MARLOW

The Hogshead will be holding a mini beer festival featuring the full range of Rebellion Brewery beers in the week commencing 12th of February.

Also on the Tuesday evening of the festival, there will be a 'Tutored Tasting' session.

RADNAGE

After a fire last year, the Crown is hoping to restart serving food by the end of February.

THAME

The Birdcage has gained a late license which allows the pub to be open until midnight on Wednesday and Thursday and until one in the morning on Friday and Saturday. However, this facility is only available to bona fide diners and

The Rose and Crown at Saunderton


An era came to an end when on 6th December last year ownership of the Rose and Crown at Saunderton passed from the Watson family to Musketeer Inns.

When Robert Lionel (Bob) Watson bought the pub 43 years ago in 1957, it was a small public house on the Wycombe to Aylesbury road and *CAMRA* wasn't even a drop in a pint pot. Part of the inventory was a

CAMRA clock that hung on the wall behind the bar, along with the tankard presented to Robert Watson on his retirement as treasurer of the Aylesbury Vale and Wycombe branch. This evidence, together with many years entry in the Good Beer Guide, suggests that though the Rose and Crown has grown into a 16 bedroom hotel, at heart it remains a hostelry that cares for its real ale.

Lionel Watson didn't buy the **Rose and Crown** without a fight. He'd been selling furniture in the South Bucks area for an East London company when the opportunity to buy the **Rose and Crown** came up. It had been his local since the Second World War. Lionel shook hands with a bigwig from *H* and *G* Simmonds on the sale and that should have been that.

However, John Coggins a good friend of Lionel's who already owned the **Brickmakers** at Cadmore End, the **Three Horseshoes** at Saunderton and the **Lions** at Bledlow, gazumped Lionel in an



attempt to expand Bucks' own pubco before pubcos had been invented. Lionel went to Reading to see the biggest bigwig of all at *Simmonds* and insisted that they should hold to their gentleman's agreement. The BBW agreed. Lionel got his pub and amazingly remained friends with John Coggins.

The pub grew and grew through the next four decades though the scenery

around hardly changed at all despite the stalled attempts of Bucks County Council to create a bypass which would have made the Rose a traffic island. Currently Central Railways are proposing 24 hour freight movements on the railtrack behind but so far this threat has also been seen off.

In 1973 Robert joined his father as licensee. His brother John was to join later. Also in 1973, Robert became a co-founder of the Aylesbury Vale and Wycombe branch of *CAMRA*. This might have been foreseen as the previous year the last keg beer was served at the Rose amid national media coverage (well, the Daily Mail and Evening Standard).

Dick Williams was chairman and Pip Elton the secretary. Not long after, the Mid Chiltern branch (or Mad Children as some knew it), broke away from Aylesbury and Wycombe. Until this time **Bass**



Charrington beers had been served from the wood, which by now, was already a throwback to times of yore.

A licence to sell liquor from the premises has existed since 1850 when the then farmer saw an opportunity to sell ale to the navvies building the new railway from Wycombe to Aylesbury. The railway featured again in the history of the Rose in the mid 1970's when a railway maintenance crew would jump over the fence and refresh themselves at lunchtime with a few choice ales. 'Real ale stops commuter trains', now there's a headline to conjure with!

Inevitably crime too has played its part in the story of the Rose. The father of the previous landlady would take farm produce into High Wycombe for sale. In order to avoid the footpads on the crime ridden roads of the day he would return by train to Princes Risborough and then make his way back to Saunderton by road. The farm takings would be put into a leather pouch and thrown out of the window as the train passed the Rose on it's way to Risborough. His daughter would be waiting by the track to safely gather in the 'harvest'.

Needless to say there are many other stories about the Rose and Crown but if you want to hear about Morgan drivers, the Archers and the naked woman you'd better ask them yourselves.

Robert and John and their respective families have now decided to call it a day at the Rose. At the time of their departure, real ales available at the Rose were Brakspears Bitter, Morrells Varsity and Rebellion Smuggler.




Good luck and thank you to the Watson's for, amongst other things, keeping the real ale flowing at the Rose and Crown.

ROYAL OAK, GREAT KINGSHILL, UPDATE

On the front cover of issue 14 (October/ November 1999) of **Swan Supping**, we highlighted the plight of the **Royal Oak**, Great Kingshill. Since then, there have been many developments (some of which we have reported in the local news section), so we felt it was time for an update of the current situation:-

Following the appeal by McKenzie Developments of Slough against the refusal by Wycombe District Planners to allow the

development of seven dwellings (five detached & a pair of semis) on the site of the **Royal Oak** Great Kingshill, McKenzie appealed to the Department of the Environment.

The appeal was heard over two days (Nov 21st & 22nd) at Wycombe Council Chamber. Evidence was given by the McKenzies' Planning Consultants. *Morrells Brewery* (former owner) in support of the development, and Wycombe District Council and Great Kingshill Residents Assn. (GKRA) against the development.

The decision was published on December 8th and the appeal was dismissed by the inspector (Clive Hughes).

He stated that (among other things) that: -

"I consider that the loss of the Public House would harm the social wellbeing of Great Kingshill."

In response to the issue of using a pub in a neighbouring village, 'a



local village pub provides a community service that cannot be replaced effectively in another settlement."

With respect to the viability, "any decline in sales could be the result of many factors such as the way the pub was run and the clear lack of investment in the premises."

Mackenzie Developments Ltd had six weeks to appeal to the High Court at the Crown Office. This expired 19th January and no such appeal has been lodged.

Great Kingshill Residents Association have tried to make contact with Mackenzie to see what his future plans for the site are and to offer support for any suitable development that includes a public house and is sympathetic to the village environment and style. To date there has been no response from Mackenzie and the GKRA will be putting their situation in writing to him in the next day or so.

Additionally GKRA have been approached by a representative of a local pub chain who are interested in acquiring the site and reopening it as a community pub and restaurant. This party has also tried to make contact with Mackenzie but similarly has had no response.

The pub remains closed as it has since September 1999.



Vale Brewery

Vale Brewery held their annual fishing competition at Biggin Pond in Dinton. The winners for this year were Ian and Shaker who represented the Hartwell Conservative Club, Northants. They will hold the challenge trophy for the next twelve months. Previous winners include the White Hart, Sherrington, Bull, Newport Pagnall and the Ship, Aylesbury.

Hadda's Winter Solstice (4.1% ABV) will be available until the end of February, from which time, Hadda's Spring Gold (4.6% ABV) will be on sale. This is a golden ale made with Maris Otter malt and the dwarf hop First Gold.

Vale have also produced a one-off brew of Hadda's Headbanger

(5.0% ABV). They are intending to produce further one-off brews as capacity allows in the future, with the possibility of *Grumpling* being produced again.

By the end of March, *Vale* will have had installed a bottling line. They are aiming to produce short runs of bottle conditioned beers both for themselves and other breweries.


Trueman's Brewery

Truemans have produced another new ale, called Bakers Best Bitter. This ale was brewed by a Dennis Baker a loyal customer of the Crown and Anchor in Marlow. He wanted to brew a session beer which could be drank in quantity, but having the taste of a premium bitter. Using pale, wheat and crystal malt with lashings of Northdown hops he has produced a remarkable brew.

An interesting combination is to top a bottle of *No Name* bottled conditioned beer (7%) with *Bakers Bitter Beer*. Called a *Don top*, it is named after the person who discovered this potent mix, the body of *No Name* combined with bitterness of *BBB* produces a satisfying drink.

Rebellion Brewery

The *Rebellion Brewery* will be showcasing their beers at a minibeer festival at the **Hogshead** in Marlow. This will take place during the week starting 12th February.



Skullsplitter smashes the competition

Scottish favourite is Supreme CAMRA Champion Winter Beer of Britain 2001

Skullsplitter from Orkney Brewery has been named the Supreme Champion Winter Beer of Britain 2001 by a panel of judges at CAMRA's national winter celebration of beer.

The fruity, 8.5% ABV barley wine took the gong from a final selection of over twenty old ales, strong milds, stouts and porters. At the announcement, *CAMRA* Scottish Director Colin Valentine congratulated *Orkney* on their ability to produce beers to perform on the national stage with companies a hundred times their size. He said, "This is tremendous news for *Orkney Brewery* and a shot in the arm for Scottish brewing. It's the first time a Scottish brewer has taken the gold medal and it's a just reward for *Orkney*'s commitment to brewing original and distinctive beers."

On hearing the news Rob Hill, Head Brewer said, "We're ecstatic. This is fantastic news for the brewery. *Skullsplitter* is a barley wine, but is more like a bitter in character due to the hop balance. It's this quality which I think has made it stand out from the crowd."

Orkney Brewery was set up in 1988 in an old school building and is Britain's second most northerly brewery. Skullsplitter is named after Thorfin, the first Viking Earl of Orkney. Orkney Brewery also won the silver award in the Strong Mild and Old Ale category of the

competition with their Dark Island beer.

The silver prize went to Sarah Hughes Brewery from Sedgeley with their superb Dark Ruby Mild and the Bronze award went to O'Hanlons Brewery in Devon for their splendid Port Stout.

British real ale is hot on the heels of fake foreign lagers 30% of men would most like to be seen drinking real ale in a pub

30% of men would most like to be seen drinking real ale in a pub according to a new survey of the pub-going habits of British people launched at the National Winter Ales Festival. 31% of men prefer lager, but real ale appears to be growing in popularity.

Mike Benner, Head of Campaigns and Communications said, "The market share of real ale has been falling for the last six years, but this survey indicates that beer drinkers are starting to turn their backs on bland fizzy lagers and head for tastier real ales, despite the lack of marketing they receive from big brewers. Hundreds of beer lovers will be joining us at the National Winter Ales Festival to try just some of those available."

The survey, commissioned by *CAMRA*, also reveals that pub going is still one of the most popular British pastimes with 26% of adults visiting a pub at least once a week.

Other findings include:

17% of people would use pubs more if they had a play area for the

25% of people choose a pub based on the price of drinks 50% of people prefer country pubs, compared to only 16% who favour themed town centre bars

Nearly a fifth (17%) of pub goers would most like to be seen drinking real ale, but 22% prefer lager.

65% of beer drinkers prefer pints to halves - and one in four women prefer pints!

53% of people choose a particular pub because of the people who use it.

Mike Benner said, "It's great to see that going to the pub is still a popular pastime. But the survey reveals some important lessons for pub companies; to build a successful business it is increasingly important to meet the needs of a wide cross-section of people through offering meeting rooms, play areas and other facilities like cash withdrawal and internet access."


"It also shows that value for money is important with a quarter of people choosing a pub on price. Despite high investment in town centre themed pubs, half of all adults prefer country pubs and a third prefer community pubs, yet it is these pubs which generally receive the least investment."

"Interestingly enough, real ale drinkers are still very important to the pub trade; 49% of them use pubs at least once a week. This compares with 26% of all people. Real ale is also the drink that 17% of people would most like to be seen drinking."

LINK UP WITH PREMIER AYLESBURY VALE WEB SITE

The Internet is now universally accepted as the fastest growing information medium, with phenomenal growth predicted over the next few years. Everywhere you look there are www addresses and Aylesbury Vale is no exception.



Last Issue (December/January), we published a letter from Mick Dunton, licensee of the Royal Standard, Wooburn Common. He raised an objection regarding the treatment of Whitbread pubs in the Good Beer Guide. Here is the reply from the editor of the guide:-

I congratulate Mick on his splendid guest beer policy and his support for independent brewers. I think, however, he misunderstands the role of CAMRA. We're not a beer appreciation society, the Ancient Order of Frothblowers, but a vigorous consumer movement campaigning for beer drinkers' rights on a wide variety of issues.

We do talk to brewers but they do not always talk to us. If Mick thinks we are high-handed, how about Whitbread -- did they consult us when they decided to sell their breweries and pubs? No, they acted solely in the interests of the City institutions that control most of their shares.

CAMRA has had talks with Interbrew at European level and we won an agreement that Interbrew would positively promote Draught Bass. However, that has been kicked into touch now that the British government has blocked the sale of Bass to the Belgian company.

CAMRA's main aim is to save the independent brewing sector, which offers the best guarantee of providing quality cask beers. If Mick cannot get his guest beers from Interbrew, there is no shortage of suppliers who will do the job for him.

CHELMSFORD AND CAMBRIDGE WINTER ALE FESTIVALS

The drinking year commenced in fine style by visiting two Winter Ale Festivals on the first two Saturdays in January. The first was at Chelmsford and was held in the Anglia Polytechnic University Student Union, which is a short walk from the town's railway station.

I arrived with my drinking colleagues Martin from East London and Robert from Basingstoke at around 12:30. The festival was already quite busy. It was held in the Students Union bar and all the available beers (around 40) were listed on blackboards above the bar. I am not really a 'winter ale' enthusiast and was relieved to see that there was plenty of lower gravity beers available including four dark milds, which is probably my favourite British Beer style. The bar manager kept a strict eye on the blackboard deleting beers as they ran out or adding them as they became available.

The venue was busy with around 200 drinkers chatting and enjoying themselves. I ran into several old friends from various parts of Essex, Herts and London, both by arrangement and by chance.

Towards the rear of the festival venue a Belgian Beer bar which provided me with the opportunity to have a kriek (cherry) and frambozen (raspberry beer). Although these may seem strange to those of you not familiar with Belgian beer they really are quite delicious and have a reviving property. Do try them if the opportunity comes along but note that, as with most Belgian beer styles they should be sipped and not gulped.

The festival closed down at around 16:00 to give the staff a rest and to allow stocks to be replenished so we adjourned to various local hostelries starting with the **Railway Tavern**. This is a small and friendly pub, not surprisingly with a railway theme where the *Greene King IPA* was well kept. We crossed the road and popped into the **Original Plough** a larger and slightly brasher pub where again I believe I had *IPA* which was fine. I also managed to catch the football results.

We then moved on to the Queen's Head which I recall from when I lived in Chelmsford in the late 80s was known as Partners. It was the best pub in the town then and still is now. There were around six ales on including another mild. The pub was friendly and comfortable with a roaring fire and had perhaps the cleanest toilet I have ever seen in a pub.

There was time to pop back briefly to the festival after leaving the **Queen's Head** before catching the train south but only for one stop as the drinking had not quite finished. The nearby village of Ingatestone has some pleasant bars the best of which is the **Star**. This is another **Greene King** pub with an excellent cellar, a roaring fire and a warm welcome from the staff. After that it really was time to go home.

The following Saturday there was more drinking to be done. Again in the company of Robert and Martin I visited the *Cambridge Winter Ale Festival* which is also hosted by Anglia Polytechnic University. The venue at Cambridge was slightly larger and there were perhaps slightly fewer people in attendance. However this gave drinkers a bit more room to walk round and circulate. The beer range was slightly smaller here and there was no Belgian or other European beer available. We were told that a number of beers had been finished the previous evening nonetheless there were still around 25 available. Fortunately for me this included a couple of milds and some bitters around the 1040-1045 mark.


Again partly by chance and partly by arrangement old friends were found and news and views exchanged. Interestingly we were told that Attilla the Stockbroker would be performing that evening, alas our plans did not include staying for the evening session as the pubs of Cambridge (or at least some of them) beckoned.

On leaving the festival the first port of call was the near by Tram Depot. A large and quiet pub with mostly *Everard's* beers. To be different I had the *Adnam's Bitter* which was quite tasty. A feature of this pub is the handpumps, which tell you the temperature at which the beer was being served. Next port of call was the **Kingston Arms**, *Lidstones Brewery's* first pub. I had the "award winning" *Rowley Mild*. All I will say is that it was not to my taste. Furthermore I was advised that the bitter was "a bit home brewish". Taste in beer, as with all things, is a personal thing. There was nothing wrong with the beer, it was just not to our liking.

Things picked up at the nearby Live and Let Live. A friendly local with good beer including the excellent *Bateman's Mild*. Next port of call was the Cambridge Blue. Another pleasant little local where the *Brakspear's Bitter* was in good form.

We concluded our mini pub crawl with a visit to 'the Ian Smith' as we jocularly refer to the **Salisbury Arms**. It is perhaps a little more 'commercial' than some of the other pubs and perhaps appeals to slightly younger clientele. However it is comfortable, had good music on the jukebox/tape and the *Tiger* was in fine form. Perhaps even more importantly we always finish in the **Salisbury** when visiting Cambridge. After that, once again, it was time to go home.

members of a new 'Diners Club Gold Card' scheme. This card costs £10 and membership is limited to 200, of which over 100 have already been sold. After the initial membership quota has been filled, it will be only available by referrals.

WEEDON

Chris Birks, his wife and Richard and Mandie Fairhurst have bought the Five Elms. This pub was a tenanted ABC house which was passed over to Pubmaster who, in turn, sold it to a company called Redwith in December 1999. The new owners bought it from Redwith and completion took place on November 16th. The tenant of the past five years has now left and it is being run by an interim manager for the next few months.

The pub has suffered from poor management over the past five years and chronic under-investment in the fabric of the building (particularly in the tenants accommodation).

They are planning a major refurbishment of the tenants area, the kitchen, the toilets and a re-decoration of the bar areas. It is their intention to preserve and enhance the charming, unspoilt, country feel of the pub, while updating essential areas to ensure that they eventually get a permanent tenant and start serving pub food again.

The pub is now a Free House committed to selling a good range of real ales (at the moment they are buying exclusively from Dayla in Aylesbury). At the moment they are selling Fullers London Pride, Brakspears Bitter and Hook Norton Bitter. It is intended to rotate these from time to time with similar ales such as Adnams/Timothy Taylor etc.

They intend to keep the pub open during the refurbishment - although until the kitchens are refitted, they will not be serving food.

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


