



Local News



ASTON CLINTON

Mick and Cilla Addley have taken over the Rothschild Arms. They are serving Wadworth 6X and Boddingtons Bitter. Some redecoration has already been done, especially the three rooms that are available for Bed & Breakfast.

AYLESBURY

Geoff Smith, of the Rose & Crown, Wingrave, has taken over the tenancy of Butlers Bar since August 26th and it will be renamed the Market Tavern.

It has been redecorated and it is planned to make more use of the upstairs room for food, especially at lunchtimes.

The beers currently on offer are Benskins Bitter and Marstons Pedigree.

The Whistlin' Duck is offering Courage Directors as their only real ale. This is priced at £1-60 per pint during happy hours and £1-85 at other (unhappy) times.

BEACONSFIELD

Greene King IPA is to replace Brakspears Bitter at the Prince of Wales. This is one of the rare places for bar billiards, and the pub team gained promotion earlier this year.

BIERTON

The Bell is now offering a guest beer in addition to a full range of Fullers beers. Gales GB was available at the time of going to press.

The pub has also won two awards recently for its frontage.

BLEDLOW

The Lions of Bledlow was featured in a recent episode of 'The Midsomer Murders' where it was called 'The Red Queen'.

BOOKER COMMON

The Live & Let Live is being advertised for sale in the Licensee.

BROUGHTON CROSSING

The Prince of Wales has been closed for renovations and is due to reopen in October.

Its name has changed to the Moat House Inn and the sign outside advertises food and wine. We will include any details on beer in the next issue.

BUTLERS CROSS

The Russell Arms has been taken over by Christian Wioland who owns the Chequers in Weston Turville. The pub has been refurbished and is now being run by Simon and Julie Asquith. The restaurant now seats fifty people, but the bar still has a traditional feel.

CADMORE END

Ray Court and Sue Hewitson at the Old Ship have been offered (and have accepted) a six year lease on the pub by *Brakspears*. They had been running the pub on a series of six month leases.

CROWELL

The Shepherds Crook is now offering Donnington BB as one of its regular beers.

CUBLINGTON

The chef has left the Unicorn and the pub no longer does food. There are fears that this will seriously affect the viability of the pub, and it is hoped that the situation will be resolved soon.

GAWCOTT

Vale Brewery's only pub, the Cuckoo's Nest, has a new manager, Phil Wyatt, who has run a number of pubs in the area. The refurbishment of the pub is also nearing completion.

HADDENHAM

ABC Bitter has been replaced by Youngs Bitter at the Red Lion.

HIGH WYCOMBE

The revamped Beaconsfield Arms is serving Benskins Bitter but not Burton Ale as it did previously.

The Black Boy, Terriers, has been renamed Terriers following its reopening after its £125k facelift on 17th September. According to the landlord Colin Nicholls and his wife Pauline, it is a locals pub offering food and is not a theme pub. They also said that the name change was to associate the pub with the local area and had nothing to do with political correctness.

The recently opened Litten Tree is a large space with different areas including tables, raised sections, no smoking area, dance floor and library! It has Courage Directors, Theakston's BB and Worthington BB under the name of 'Litten Tree BB'.

There are various special events and theme nights each day of the week.

They have a strict dress code, with bouncers enforcing - smart casual, no trainers, and leisure shirts must have collars.

It has been reported that the nearby Bell put out a notice saying 'Trainers Welcome', and that it has also benefited from the increase in trade in the area.

ICKFORD

The Rising Sun has had a new floor put into its cellar. They are currently serving Hancock's HB, Marston's Pedigree and Wadworth 6X. A fourth beer is planned to be available from early October.

MARLOW

The Chequers has become one of the pubs to be leased from Brakspears by a new pub group called Honeypot Inns. This group is being headed by David Bruce, founder of the Firkin pub chain and a director of Brakspears.

Planning permission has been sought for a single storey side extension and alterations to the Clayton Arms. The proposed alterations will change the pub completely as the plan is to open it up into yet another food and drink tourist facility, the like of which Marlow has in abundance.

At present, the pub caters for the local people, and the earlier renovations carried out only three years ago managed to maintain its character, whilst bringing it more up to date.





Custom built in Devon, the new tank was ordered, fabricated, delivered and installed in just a few weeks.


The new tank increases the





Food will be available until 10.30pm each night.



and Communications said, "The Firkin chain has offered a unique service to pub goers since it was created in 1979 and has helped high streets."

The decision to close the breweries follows the Punch Taverns takeover of the Allied Domecq pub estate including the Firkin chain. Beers like *Dogbolter* will be lost forever.

Mr Benner added, "CAMRA has urged the Office of Fair Trading to refer this merger to the Competition Commission for a full investigation of the effects on consumer choice. These closures prove that referral is the only way forward as consumer choice is already being affected only days after the deal has been finalised."
