



ASTON CLINTON

The Oak is to celebrate being 500 years old by holding a beer festival between Friday 6th and Sunday 8th of August. A marquee will be erected over the patio area and, weather permitting, there will be seating for over 100 people in their award winning garden. There will be a pig roast on the Saturday. The list of beers was undecided at the time of going to press.

AYLESBURY

The Aylesbury Duck, the new Morlands pub with the Family & Friends theme on Jackson Road, opened on the 22nd of May.

This seems to be an excellent compromise between a community pub and an place to take a family.

There is a separate bar for the 'over 18s' with a raised area for a pool table, a separate darts playing area and the ubiquitous large TV showing all the sports events.

The other bar caters solely for families eating and drinking. There is a padded climbing frame in the Children's play area and a large TV in the 'Cinema' showing the Disney channel.

They have three real ales on the handpump at present: Morlands

Independent IPA, Old Speckled Hen and Ruddles County.

There has been a lot of controversy due to the pub sign. The first one showed a Mallard, not an Aylesbury Duck and will be auctioned off for charity. Morlands arranged for a replacement, but duck fanciers have pointed out that the new one is a picture of a Pekin Duck. Lets hope that the sign is sorted out before we all go quackers!

John and Julie Burrell have become the new managers at the Farmyard & Firkin.

The Huntsman has had a new landlord since April. Although the pub has been painted green and had what looks to the layman like shamrock logos (it is actually clover!) all round, it is essentially the same as before. When visited, there were three real ales: Fullers London Pride, Ruddles Best, and most surprisingly Harveys Bitter.

The tenancy of Queens Head has changed hands. Ian Brown left at the end of April and two local businessmen, Les Shardlow and John Haydon (well known for

organising the Haddenham Ceilidhs), have taken it over with the express intention of keeping the pub exactly the same as it is.

Christina Smith will become the joint licensee and will be in charge of the day to day running of the pub. Upcoming guest beers include Tisbury Old Wardour, Beartown Bearskinful and Caledonian Golden Promise.

One minor change is that the pub opens half an hour later each day at 11:30am.

CADMORE END

At the Blue Flag, Vicki Chevis, the widow of Ken Chevis, who sadly died in March, is determined to carry on the business despite her loss, and has said that the combined pub, restaurant and hotel is not up for sale.

It did not, however, take too long after the death for the vultures to begin making inquiries. They started ringing up about it on the day after the funeral!

The tragedy at the Blue Flag caused us to miss out the changes at the Old Ship last issue. Ray Court and Sue Hewitson have replaced Ken Smith who left in February.

FORD

The Dinton Hermit is being advertised for sale at £350,000. Looks like a visit to the Lottery Ticket shop is in order!!

GREAT KIMBLE

The Bernard Arms has reopened after having been closed for less than a week when the landlord left after being unable to meet his VAT bill. It is now an Oast House Inn run by Fraser Shackelton who was previously at the Three Horeshoes in Watford. They are currently serving Adnams Best Bitter, Benskins Bitter, Fullers London Pride and a guest beer which was Hook Norton Old Hooky when last visited.

HADDENHAM

The Green Dragon is being advertised in 'The Licensee' as being for sale.

HIGH WYCOMBE

The plastic coating has come off the Beaconsfield Arms. Despite objections from the regulars, it has become a Mr. Q's, but there is a ray of hope with a solitary handpump that has been spotted.

The Bell, Frogmore, is under new management. They are still selling Fullers London Pride and ESB.

The Litton Tree, the new all purpose pub opposite the Bell, will be opening shortly. I trust they are not counting on too much trade from the building next door — it's the Salvation Army Hall.

The Roundabout is currently being refurbished.

KINGSWOOD

The Plough & Anchor reopened on April 16th after having been closed since January. Major work inside includes the ceiling being raised at one end to expose the oak and elm beams and an open fireplace being installed. Work is continuing as the pub is being extended into the barn adjoining the pub. Although the landlords, Paul Ring and Duncan Harris, intend to concentrate on the food side, offering freshly prepared food, home made bread and pasta.

Drinkers will be welcome and they have two real ales, Ruddles County and Morlands Old Speckled Hen, both of which are served on gravity.

LITTLE KIMBLE

Planning permission has been applied for to build two houses on the site of the Kimble Diner, previously the Crown, which we reported as closed last issue.

LOUDWATER

The White Blackbird has reopened as a pub and is currently serving one real ale: Courage Best.

MARLOW

Colin Wiley, the landlord of the Hogshead, is offering twenty pence a pint off cask conditioned beers as long as they are not part of any other promotion. This is only available to CAMRA members on production of their membership cards.

OVING





Every year, CAMRA, the Campaign for Real Ale, organises hundreds of beer festivals all around the country. They are all run by volunteers who give up their time and energy to show the public the wealth of variety and flavour that represents what we know as beer but in particular, real ale.

Beer is first thought to have been brewed by the Egyptians. It has spread around the world and developed various styles. In Belgium for example, there are beers called Lambics which are brewed with wild Britain, the yeast is traditionally to Saturday 7th August. cultivated and each brewer will safeguard the quality of their yeast by careful cleaning and control.

Yeast is very important to beer, as it is responsible for turning the malt (which is roasted barley) into alcohol. The malt gives the colour to a beer and can vary from very pale to black according to how much roasting has taken place. Black malt is used in beers such as stouts and porters. All beer festivals like to pride themselves on the variety of beers presented and the largest that CAMRA runs is the Great British Beer Festival which is held every year in August. There the visitor is treated to over 300 different real ales plus hundreds of beers from all over the world. So why not take a visit to the Festival and compare British beer to others and see how beer has developed in far-flung corners of the world.

This year's festival is to be held at yeast producing an acidic beer. In Olympia, from Tuesday, August 3rd





Last month the local branch paid a visit to the picturesque Suffolk seaside town of Southwold. This, as all beer lovers should know, is the home of Adnams Brewery – one the truly great breweries of Britain.

Twelve members including four wives enjoyed a wonderful weekend visiting the pubs, a guided tour of the brewery and just enjoying the scenery and the relaxing atmosphere.

The Lord Nelson, Sole Bay Inn, Red Lion, Crown Hotel and Swan Hotel all had excellent bars and beer.





by the Old Luxters winery which is owned by David Ealand.


Jilly Goolden, BBC Food & Drink's wine expert, took the assembled crowd through a wine tasting session of some of the eight wines in the range.

Traders Ale is a 5% aby hand crafted English Farmhouse Ale, which is brewed using traditional methods and ingredients.





Lambourne Valley Cider was formed in December 1995 by Roy & Alice Bailey, to produce real Berkshire cider from local apples.

A Fair Deal for New Year Revellers

CAMRA has welcomed the Government's progress on the relaxation of pub opening hour restrictions on New Year's Eve starting with the Millennium celebrations. The draft order now goes to Committee stage, the Committee having sixty days to make a formal report.

If the order goes through 'on the nod' pubs will be allowed to stay open from 11am on New Year's Eve through to 11pm on New Year's Day.

Mike Benner, Head of Campaigns and Communications said, "This is a major step forward towards a sensible and permissive approach to pub opening hours and we are confident of its success. Responsible drinkers who want to celebrate the Millennium in their favourite local pub will hopefully be able to do so without being forced to sup up and go home or go to a night club which doesn't meet their needs."

Mr. Benner added, "This deregulation will help combat the problems associated with binge drinking on the run up to closing time and will help relieve the strains on public services caused by drinkers being forced to leave pubs at the same time."

CAMRA supports liberalisation of pub opening hours subject to proper controls to protect the public from nuisance. The Government is committed to a full review of liquor licensing law, but we are unlikely to see new legislation until 2001.

Mr. Benner said, "A prohibitive approach to licensing is not an effective way to target problem drinkers and we support a more

permissive system which does not penalise the majority of responsible drinkers just to try to control a few alcohol abusers. Liberating measures introduced in 1988 and 1995 have not seen a significant increase in consumption and I believe this measure will demonstrate the benefits to all of a more liberal approach."

Courage loses its bottle

CAMRA has condemned the announcement made by Scottish & Newcastle that they are to close one of the oldest breweries in the country. The Courage Brewery in Bristol will close in 6 months with the loss of 71 jobs.

Ian Woolverton, CAMRA's Press Officer said, "This is absolutely devastating news. We are outraged at this decision. There has been a brewery on this site since 1702. Its closure will be a great loss to English brewing heritage."

Mr Woolverton went on to say, "The greatest loser in all this madness will be the consumer. Many traditional ales will be lost forever reducing consumer choice. Beers under threat include its famous Directors, Best Bitter and Georges Bitter, popular in many Bristol pubs.

CAMRA is committed to the survival of small and regional breweries up and down the country.

Mr Woolverton continued, "Repeatedly large brewers argue that there is no demand for real ale, but this is simply not true. Many national breweries have starved their real ale products of the investment that they need. The multi million pound marketing budgets that can help to create a strong brand have been awarded to nitro-keg beers at the expense of traditional real ale. That is the real reason for the lack of demand in the real ale market."

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
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BEER FESTIVAL NEWS






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BRANCH MEMBERS ABROAD
