# FULL PINTS ON THE WAY!!!!

The Campaign for Real Ale is celebrating the success of Dennis Turner MP's Private Members Bill. The Bill had its second reading on December 12th without objection. It will now go to the standing committee hopefully in early January.

Mike Benner, Head of Campaigns said, "This is tremendous news for drinkers. It will hopefully be illegal to sell a short pint by the Spring Solstice. Our members have been campaigning for full pints for years and it's good to see all that hard work is finally coming to fruition."

"This will be very popular with consumers who are tired of being ripped off. Our recent survey showed that 84% of adults think a pint should be a pint of liquid. If the final stages of the Bill go well Trading Standards Officers will soon have the power to prosecute pubs who don't serve full pints."

Dennis Turner MP who initiated the Bill said today, "I am elated. The Bill received unanimous support from Members and I am confident it will progress through the remaining stages quickly. It's all down to fairness - it's a simple and honest measure for drinkers."

Aylesbury MP, David Liddington, is not so sure about the bill. In a reply to a

letter from Swan Supping's editor, Mr Liddingon said that whilst he was keen to see fair trading maintained, he had 'severe doubts about whether Mr Turner's bill is an effective solution. The bill has overtones of the nanny state and a far more practical course of action is for customers simply to request that their pint is topped up once it has settled.'

He continued, 'If it were to become law, this bill would require the replacement of every pint glass in the country, a cost that would certainly be passed on to the consumer.' Mr Liddington's letter has been described by a **CAMRA** spokesman as 'the most negative letter from an MP' that he has seen.

# GUARANTEE TOLL PINTS

A reply has been sent to Mr Liddington explaining that, as pubs replace their stock of glasses on average every 18 months, and if a two year phasing in period were allowed, then there would be no additional cost to the industry or the consumer.

Consumer Affairs Minister Nigel Griffiths fully supports the Bill. Mr. Griffiths said, "I am determined to see that beer drinkers get a fair deal." Research by Trading Standards Officers and CAMRA earlier this year showed that 8 out of 10 pints are short and that 1 in 4 are less than the industry's own guidelines of 95% liquid.

CAMRA spokesman Mike Benner says, "CAMRA will not give up the fight for a full-pint." Under 26?

# NEW YEAR SALE

CAMRA, The Campaign for Real Ale, announced its disappointment at Bass's decision to sell 1428 tenanted pubs and called for government action to protect consumer choice.

The new owner is not a national brewer and is not legally bound to allow tenants to take a guest beer from a supplier of their choice.

Ben Wardle of CAMRA said, "This is bad news for beer lovers and for Britain's hundreds of small brewers. The guest beer law has been universally successful in promoting choice and opening up the beer market. Over 1400 pubs will now lose that right."

CAMRA saved the guest beer law earlier this year following a challenge from a small UK wholesaler. From April 1998 the law will be extended to

include bottle-conditioned beers. CAMRA will be campaigning hard for an amendment to the Beer Orders legislation to force large pub chains to offer a guest beer.

Ben Wardle added, "We will be asking the Government to take a second look at the effects on choice following the purchase of IPCL by Nomura and now the sale of these Bass pubs to a pizzachain entrepreneur. This development serves undermine the spirit of the legislation and can only be bad for pub users. We think the effects on consumers of supply central beer agreements are the same regardless of who owns the pub."

"It appears that Bass is only concerned with investing in national themed chains. We

# Ivinghoe Aston

Villagers in Ivinghoe Aston have clubbed together and bought the village local to save it from demolition. The Swan was turned into the Mermaid fish restaurant two years ago. When that business failed, an offer was put in for the pub by a developer who planned to knock down the pub and build houses on the site. A committee was set up by villagers and within 24 hours they raised £151,000. Their offer for the pub was beaten and so the villagers turned to Aylesbury Vale District Council to rule on planning permission. They won the case and after a further bidding war the villager's offer was accepted on November 11th. The first pint in the renamed Village Swan was pulled on 29th November. Ivinghoe Aston is just outside the branch area

#### Wendover

The King & Queen have given up the Tapsters Choice range of guest beers due to 'no demand for real ale'. Therefore it's back to just the Tetleys.

The Office was sold to Vintage Inn, a division of Bass Taverns, on 13th October. A £1.5 million facelift is planned to turn the pub into an old coaching inn. Last orders were called on December 19th and it will re-open at the beginning of May. It is also planned to change the name of the pub (again). Suggestions have included its old name, The Halfway House, The Six Bells and The Dog and Partridge. The new licensee has also applied for planning permission for an extension to the kitchen, beer cellar and car park. Wendover Parish Council objected to the changes to the Grade II listed building and urged Bucks County Council to consider the plans carefully. The application was due to be discussed on January 8th. Other changes include the provision of disabled facilities, an open fire and the widening of the London Road.

# Weston Turville

The Chequers has been hit by the curse of the Good Beer Guide. The pub was an entry this year but as the guide was published things changed. This popular pub has been sold to Inn Business based in Whitchurch.

# Long Crendon

Frank and Joyce Buckingham have left The Star and retired to Towcester. The new landlords are Sue and Dennis Hooper from Uxbridge.

# Marlow

Fred and Doreen Boxall have left the Two Brewers. Roger and Carole Shippey have left the Chequers and the pub has become a managed house. The Crown has applied for planning permission to turn it into a theme pub. The lease for The Ship was on offer in October for £125,000. (See also p7)

# **Great Kimble**

Prime Minister, Tony Blair, held a press conference in the **Bernard Arms**, while spending Christmas at Chequers. The pub has been used by many Prime Ministers over the years. It was also visited by Russian President Boris Yeltsin accompanied by John Major.

# Aylesbury

The old Muswells bar reopened in October as Hampdens. There is no real ale on offer. Real ale briefly returned to the Buckingham Arms but now its back to keg only..

The Queens Head applied for and received planning permission for an extension into a neighbouring building.

The Millwrights in Aylesbury was the first pub in Aylesbury Vale to install one of the new *Pronto* pub lottery games. 2,000 of the controversial machines were installed in the first wave. 20% of the cost of a ticket goes to charity with a top prize of £25,000.

#### Pubs in bloom

Two local pubs won awards Vanguard Lease Company Pubs in Bloom Contest. The **Ship** in Aylesbury was judged to have the best hanging baskets in Bucks and the **Churchill Arms**, Long Crendon won the prize for best garden and patio in the county. The winning landlords received a certificate and bottle of champagne.

# Bishopstone

The landlord and landlady of the Harrow left in October after three years.

# Lacey Green

Dick and Brenda Williams have left The Whip after 21 years. Brenda says she may write a book about their time in the pub. The new landlords at The Whip are Richard and Karen Pither.

# Whiteleaf

The 17th Century Red Lion, a favourite with walkers, was put on the market for around £350,000. Richard Howard, the licensee, bought the pub ten years ago and his son, Tony, has been running the business for him. The Howards have bought a pub in Exmoor, near the Somerset border because Richard wishes to retire to Exmoor to be close to the hunting community. The Red Lion is likely to remain a "free" house following the sale.

# Prestwood

The King's Head has reopened selling Marston's Pedigree, Owd Roger and Bateman's Dark Mild.

#### Marsworth

The landlady of the Red Lion, Christine Brake, died while on holiday in Turkey.

#### **Askett**

The kitchen at The Black Horse was damaged by a fire late on Sunday 26th October.

#### Waddesdon

Aylesbury Vale District Council have given the go ahead for outbuildings at the Five Arrows to be converted into a function room. There will also be a new outdoor seating area.

# Bierton

The landlord and landlady of the Red Lion have left following a letter campaign complaining to the brewery about a row over a cancelled darts match. Eldridge Pope say that Gary Folksman and Elizabeth Mansfield were not happy and they handed in their notice. They said that they "wanted to leave quickly". A former barmaid has said that the complaints originated because the couple would not agree to illegal late night opening and that the locals did not like people coming from other areas.

challenge the new owners to do the right thing for drinkers and invest in these pubs as community assets rather than crass theme bars."

The new owners of the Bass pubs are Hugh Osmond, who made a fortune out of the Pizza Express chain, and Roger Myers, founder of Cafe Rouge Brasseries. they think that there is still money to be made from old-style tenanted pubs. At least £30 million has been set aside to renovate pubs over the next 3 years. They will be looking at new food concepts but the type of food offered will vary from pub to pub.

At the time of going to press, rumours were beginning to circulate that Bass were interested in buying the pub group and former brewerGreenalls.

#### Charles Wells

Charles Wells have opened a new pub, The Bombadier, in Paris selling cask ales. They already have several pubs abroad, mainly in Italy. It is hoped that the pub will attract French customers as well as British expatriates. The pub is a joint venture between Charles Wells and French drinks agency, Tradelink.

# No Smoking?

Health minister, Tessa Jowell, is planning to legislate to force pubs into taking action to limit smoking in public. Breweries and pub operators in a bid to avoid legislation, are urging publicans to act to protect the interests of nonsmokers. The Brewers and Licensed Retailers Association (BLRA) has made a submission to the Department of Health. They say that pubs should look at the following:

- Non-smoking area or rooms especially in family rooms and restaurants
- Improved smoke extraction, ventilation and air quality

# CHILTERN BREWERY

On 5th December the Brewery Liaison Officer for Chiltern, John Wood, was invited to the brewery for the launch of new brewery related products. This brewery has specialised in a number of adjunct products in addition to mainstream brewing of draught beers for consumption on

site or at about 5 regular pub outlets. Three bottled beers are produced, one of them bottle conditioned. These are sold on site and are available through outlets such as Tescos.

Previous products, still available, include mustards, sausages, shampoo, cheeses, beer cakes and pickles, all of which contain one or other of the draught beers (albeit in small quantities). The brewery has a full on and off licence and also sells organic wines, various ciders (including at least one on draught - normally Old Rosie), and locally produced English table wine grown by a registered vineyard in the Hale Valley in Wendover.

The launch consisted of three further products:

- A painting of the brewery by well-known local Chiltern artist Gladys Crook. This will be made into cards and notelets etc. The artist was on hand during this evening to sign copies of her work. Many copies of her local paintings are sold as Christmas cards in the Bucks area.
- The brewery has for several months kept a flock of Jacobs Sheep in a field at the rear of the brewery buildings and the fleeces have now been spun by a West Country company into balls of wool for sale. A sample cardigan made from Jacobs Wool is displayed. Additionally three sheep related soaps are available: Wool Fat Soap, Lanolin Fleece Soap and Wool Fat Shaving Soap.
- In conjunction with a local producer of Belgian chocolates in Aylesbury (Rumsey's), two liqueur chocolates have been added to the range. One contains Three Hundreds Old Ale, and the other (to a different design), Bodgers Barley Wine. They are quite moreish.

The brewery site consists of two parallel former farm buildings with the shop at the front. Permission has now been obtained to convert the unused part of the site into self catering accommodation to rent out presumably to occupants who will not mind brewing being undertaken at an early hour next door!

Brewery trips can be pre-booked (*Phone 01296 613647 for details*) and the regular non bookable tour for all-comers continues at 12 noon on Saturdays.



# 1997 - A Year of Change

1997 began, as it was to continue, with a long running take-over saga, the *Bass* bid for *Carlsberg-Tetley*. The Trade and Industry secretary, Margaret Becket eventually refused this, in June. The fall out from her decision was that 1,500 jobs were lost and two breweries are to close. Mrs Becket argues that more jobs would have been lost if permission had been granted. Finally, in November, *Bass* purchased *Carlsberg-Tetley*'s Burton brewery.

Scottish and Newcastle (S&N) purchased Thistle Inns in July but the major pub sale of the year took place in October when Nomura bought the Intrepreneur Pub Company and Spring Inns in a 5,000 pub deal worth £1.2billion. Again this was referred Margaret Becket but this was one sale that was allowed through. The pubs will be merged into the Grand Pub Company early this year and supply deals have been signed with Whitbread and S&N.

But all these dealings were nothing compared to the £24billion merger of *Grand Met* and *Guinness*. The merger

went through despite opposition from rival spirits companies and referrals to competition authorities in America and Europe. The new company is *Diageo* although *Guinness* will be retained as the name of the brewing operation. The other major players in the UK industry, *Whitbread* and *Allied* have been quiet this year but rumours persist about their future.

On the regional side both Eldridge Pope and Gibbs Mew quit brewing. Vaux and Wolverhampton & Dudley were urged to follow but have so far resisted. Greene King decided to remain in brewing. Morlands purchased Ruddles and an announcement on the future of the Rutland plant is expected soon. Welsh brewer S A Brain bought rival Crown Buckley.

More pub mergers and buyouts took place in 1997. Century Inns bought Royal Freehouses in March and followed that with the purchase of the managed pubs of Pubmaster. This included the Tap & Spile group. Enterprise Inns bought Discovery Inns

in May. *Inn Business* of Whitchurch bought the *Hooden Horse Inns* chain in April. New companies entered the pub market last year. Sirenia was formed in October with the backing of Firkin founder, David Bruce. Sirenia was later renamed Ambishus Pub Company. The latest idea from the creator of the Newt & Cucumber chain, Chris Hutt, is Wizard Inns. He has bought 30 pubs from *Phoenix* and plans another 50 pubs in the next couple of years. Avebury Taverns bought 147 pubs from Wolverhampton & Dudley. In November Grovebase bought 548 pubs from Phoenix.and then last month another 1,428 pubs from *Bass*.

So what will 1998 bring? What's the future for cash strapped Greenalls and Wolverhampton & Dudley? The beer market continues to decline which will mean there will probably be more buyouts, mergers and closures in the pipeline. Japanese investment banks have only recently been investing in British pubs but with the current state of the South East Asian economies what does the future hold? Industry analysts predict that Jennings will buy a pub company in the near future and that Burtonwood will also make a major purchase. Greenalls could restructured or sold and on the cider side, Merrydown is predicted to be sold. So 1998 looks to be an interesting year.





# GOOD BEER GUIDE

1999 APPROACHES



We've just celebrated the New Year and already it's *Good Beer Guide* time again! No sooner has one edition been published than we have to start thinking about the next. The 1998 guide came out in October – publication always takes place at that time of year to catch pre-Christmas sales.

The selection process for the 1999 guide has to be complete by mid March so *now* is the time for all CAMRA members to be giving this some serious thought.

We are often asked who chooses the pubs and how they are selected. The first thing to bear in mind is that each CAMRA branch has a fixed allocation for its area based on the total number of pubs and the population of that area. Aylesbury Vale & Wycombe contains about 380 pubs (340 in Buckinghamshire and 40 in Oxfordshire) and our *Good Beer Guide* allocation is 34 pubs (31 in Bucks and 3 in Oxon). Thus the final choice represents about the best 10% of local pubs. Branches must not exceed their allocation, but are under

enough pubs are up to standard.

CAMRA doesn't use paid inspectors to survey pubs; nor can pubs pay to get in the guide. All surveys are done by unpaid CAMRA volunteers. These are usually members

no obligation to use all their allocation if they don't consider

of the local committee or active members but we would always welcome suggestions for new contenders or help with surveying.

Which pubs qualify? Obviously they must sell real ale and it must be of excellent quality. Additionally pubs have to

fulfil certain criteria of CAMRA national policy – for example pubs selling beer or cider by misleading dispense methods will not qualify. Throughout the year we monitor quality by keeping records of beers we have tasted. The tasting scores are recorded on a computer database which usually generates a shortlist of about 50 pubs which reach the minimum standard. This list has to be reduced to 34 pubs (as already mentioned earlier) and is decided by a vote being taken by the local committee.

Sometimes a worthy pub will be overlooked – this, of course, is very regrettable but illustrates the point that we need input from a far wider spectrum of local members who are prepared to submit tasting scores

throughout the year or to make recommendations of particular pubs or to assist the experienced members with the surveying.





# 4th Vale of Aylesbury Beer Festival - Diary

Monday -A trip to CAMRA HQ in St. Albans is organised to pick up taps, chocks, glasses and other paraphernalia necessary to run the festival. Tuesday -The beer arrives and is chocked up on the scaffolding. Wednesday - Time to vent the barrels. This involves knocking in the plug at the top and inserting a spile for the uninitiated. The Peddlers Pride is a bit lively and a bucket and mop are soon at hand. The taps are cleaned in preparation for tapping.

Thursday - A large rubber mallet and one good hit knocks in the tap and (hopefully) no beer is lost. Time to sample the beers for the first time. If the beer is in as good condition for the festival as it is now then there should be no problems. The soft spiles are replaced by hard spiles to prevent the beer from losing its condition.

Friday - Before the festival opens its time to decorate the hall and put the final touches to the bar including adding the sponsors names to the end of the barrels. (All the 24 beers and the 2 ciders were sponsored this year.) Time for one last check on the quality of the beers and then the doors are opened and the crowds start to arrive. Soon it's standing room only and panic as the reserve stocks of glasses are deployed. The planned entertainment was cancelled at the last minute so we were able to squeeze a few more people in. By the end of the night one of the 24 barrels had been drunk dry (Wobbly Bob) and some others were looking low. Although there should be enough for Saturday phone calls were made to local brewers and eventually extra stock for Saturday was found. Saturday - An early start for staff and drinkers. The festival opened at 11am. Steady sales followed a slow start and the beers began to slowly disappear. Two new brews were added to from Rebellion in Marlow (IPA) and Mutiny) By early evening the ciders are starting to run out and the perry follows shortly afterwards. By the end of he festival their were still around ten beers available if any one was still capable. When the 'time' is called at 11pm, it was time to start to clear up and prepare the barrels and other equipment for return to the suppliers.

Sunday - A day of rest (almost). Time to take stock and count up the votes for the Beer of the Festival. (It was Woodfordes Wherry!)

Monday - The scaffolding is taken down, the now empty barrels are taken back by Dayla and the hall is cleaned. Time to think about next year!





# **National News**



#### **Festival Ale House**

The Festival Ale House chain has promised to give drinkers another pint or their money back if they don't like the beer they have bought as part of a campaign to promote real ale.

# Guinness

Guinness are offering a colder version of their stout to attract lager drinkers. The temperature will be reduced from 7C to 3C.

# Yates Wine Lodge

The Manchester based Yates Wine lodge pub chain are pegging the cost of a pint of Boddingtons Bitter to £1.25 and Carling Black Label at £1.40 across the country, ignoring the North-South beer divide. CAMRA hopes that big brewers will be forced to follow and that what many claim is regional price rigging may come to an end. The move has been welcomed by the Consumer Affairs Minister, Nigel Griffiths.

# Frog & Parrot

The Frog & Parrot in Sheffield is giving tins of baked beans to students buying rounds in order to make sure that they get something to eat.

#### **S&N Retail**

Scottish & Newcastle Retail have closed two of its four home brew pubs, Abington Park in Northampton and the Greyhound, Streatham.

# **Special Brews**

Fullers released a limited edition of its 1997 Vintage Ale (8.5%). Only 4,000 cases were brewed.

The Somerset brewery, Ash Vine, celebrated its 10th birthday with X-traordinary (4.8%)

The Hobgoblin in Reading had a cask lager specially brewed to celebrate its 1664th guest Ale. Wychwood 1664 at 5.6% is unlikely to be repeated.

Wiltshire's Tisbury Brewery's winter ale available until the end of January is Old Mulled Ale (4.5%).

Banbury Brewery was planning a 6% winter warmer to be brewed with chocolate and smoked malts and sold in polypins.

# Cask Marque

Britain's brewers are to launch a scheme aimed at improving the quality of real ale in pubs. A plaque, the Cask Marque, is at he heart of the scheme which will be awarded to publicans whose real ales withstand repeated tests by qualified inspectors. The aim is to involve 1,000 pubs in a pilot scheme to run between January and April with up to 2,500 plaques being awarded by the end of the year. Ten brewers are taking part in the pilot including founders Whitbread, Carlsberg-Tetley, Vaux, Mansfield, Fullers and McMullen.

# Champion Winter Beer

Nethergate's Old Growler has won CAMRA's prestigious Champion Winter Beer of Britain Awards.

Brewed in the medieval Suffolk wool-town of Clare, Old Growler is named after the head brewer's dog. The beer is currently available in the brewery's one tied house, The Bell, and about 180 free trade outlet. CAMRA's latest Good Beer Guide describes it as "A complex and satisfying porter, smooth and distinctive. Sweetness, roast malt and fruit feature in the palate, with bitter chocolate lingering. The finish is powerfully hoppy."

Dick Burge, MD of the Suffolk Brewery said "It's wonderful news, I'm dumbstruck. I'm delighted for the brewing staff who are dedicated to quality"

# Whitbread

Whitbread have axed nine of their cask ale brands from its national portfolio including Fremlins, Wethereds, Chesters and Winter Royal. Warrington's Burtonwood brewery will be brewing Higsons Bitter for Whitbread.

Speculation is mounting that Whitbread is planning to sell off its brewing division, Whitbread Beer Company, to its managing director, Miles Templeman. He is said to be seeking finance from Heineken to buy the division.



# **Beer Duty**

The Labour government has announced it is keen to lower the British drink-drive limit from 80 mg of alcohol to 50mg to bring it in line with other European countries. There are, however, no plans to harmonise duty on beer to bring that in line with our partners. At present Britain pays duty rates five times higher than those in France. Kent brewer, Shepherd Neame, is taking the government to court claiming that, by not harmonising duty, the government is in breach of the Treaty of Rome. Article 99 of the treaty says that member states must harmonise taxes, including excise duty. Article 102 stresses members must take no steps to distort trade between countries in the EU. The Gordon Brown, chancellor, announced a 1p duty rise from January 1st which will mean a price rise of up to 3p.

The society of Small Independent Brewers (SIBA) has stepped up its campaign for a sliding scale of beer duty. The government has been conducting a review of excise levels. Members of SIBA lobbied parliament on November 5th to press for lower rates of duty for smaller producers. They say that the 1989 Monopolies Commission report said that the industry was anti-competitive and suggested a sliding scale of duty to help small brewers. SIBA set up their own web site where supporters encouraged to enter their names. (http://www.brewworld.com/siba/ prl.html)

# Hogshead

The Hogshead chain is to expand with an investment programme costing £50 million. The company plans to add an extra 40 pubs to its existing 123 over the next 12 months.

# **Brewery News**

Salopian Brewery of Shrewsbury has gone into liquidation.

Ushers of Trowbridge are investing £4 million to cope with its expanding brewing contracts including Gibbs Mew.

Six weeks after the closure of

Cambrian brewery in North Wales a new micro-brewery came on stream. While the plant was being installed, Brecknock Brewery was having its beers brewed by Warrington's CoachHouse. The new brewery is 12 miles from Swansea and the founder, Icelander Hordur Baldvinsson, is producing his own 3.8% ABV Original and 5% Premium.

Britain's most northerly brewery was due to go into production in December. The title was previously owned by Orkney brewery but a new brewery on the Shetland island of Unst has taken the title. The planned brew is Auld Rock (4.5%) after the name expats give the Shetlands.

Ossan's Ale (4.1%) is the third beer from Scotland's Inveralmend brewery.


Everards have withdrawn its cask winter warmer Daredevil and replaced it with the seasonal special, Nutcracker (5%).

Morrells has axed College Ale and produced a new weaker brew, Proctor (5.8%).

The Cumbria based brewer Jennings is rumoured to be about to buy the Devonshire Pub Company who own about 85 pubs.

# Millenium Party?

The Government has drawn up plans to allow pubs to open for 24 hours a day from Christmas Eve 1999 to New Years Day 2000. A six month consultation period will give interested parties a chance to make their views known. The Brewers and Licensed Retailers Association (BLRA) and Federation of Licensed Victuallers are supporting the proposal. Extended licensing hours were in Manchester allowed and Liverpool during Euro 96. The police, courts, councils and other interested parties are invited to make their views known to the Home Office. The view of the police is that, whatever decision is made, it should applied be nationally.
