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

### Local News



#### **AYLESBURY**

There have been major changes on the pub front in Aylesbury, with even more to come.

In the new leisure complex, built on the site of the old cattle market, there have been three new outlets opened.

The Hogshead, however, is the only one of the three to offer real ale. They now offer the biggest selection in the area and were selling Fullers London Pride, Young's Special, Boddington's Bitter, Marston's Pedigree and Flower's Original all on the handpump. In addition they had two guest beers on gravity which were Wychwood Shires and Vale Edgar's Golden Ale when last visited.

They are also offering a wide range of Belgian bottled beers.

The Chicago Rock Café was never expected to be a real ale outlet, and has lived up to expectations. It seems to be true to its name and will be concentrating on live music and food, and will just be offering the usual lagers and nitrokeg beers.

However, the opening of Yates Wine Lodge was something we had looked forward to, in fact it was featured way back in issue 6.

Imagine the disappointment felt when on entering we found only ranks of keg fonts and not a sign of a handpump anywhere! Especially as the others we know in this pub group, such as the one in Harrow, all serve a selection of real ale.

According to its own publicity, 'It's not like any Yates's you've seen before'. What a pity!!

Although it cannot be counted as a pub, the opening of the Boulevard café in Bourbon Street should be mentioned, though, again, there is no real ale.

Building work is continuing on the new Club Med which is due to open in Kingsbury Court. Further details next issue.

With all these new premises opening (plus a brand new cinema complex), there are going to be lots more people coming into the town. But where are they going to park? Is there any hope that public transport will be improved to cope, especially with more late night trains and buses? Some hope!

#### BEACONSFIELD

A proposal to replace the old style bay windows of the White Horse has been rejected by the local council. The change would have changed the look of the street and would not have been in keeping with Beaconsfield Old town.

#### FRIETH

The Prince Albert has had its living room converted into a twelve seat restaurant. Meals, all home-cooked fresh food, are served from Wednesday to Saturday.

#### **GAWCOTT**

Cuckoo's Nest, formally opened on 26th of November. It's new landlords are Ken and Margaret Burt, well known local characters amongst pub-goers as previous landlords of the Red Lion, Finmere, and the Queens Head, Chackmore.

The pub's renovations are now complete, and it will continue to be known as a friendly local, offering *Vale* brewery beers plus guest ales from £1-50 per pint.

#### **HIGH WYCOMBE**

John Puddephat, formerly at the Belle Vue, is the new landlord at the Desborough Arms.

The Hobgoblin is now selling six traditional beers and all are selling well.

The Iron Duke, still under offer according to the board outside, is now offering Wychwood Bitter as well as Courage Best Bitter and Directors.

Demolition of the Skinners Arms has now been completed.

#### LANE END

The Clayton Arms has been sold to a pub chain and the Osborne Arms has also been sold.

#### LITTLE KINGSHILL

The Full Moon has had new licensees for the last month. Alan and Pam Sandell have moved there from the White Horse, Harefield.

#### **MARLOW**

Despite the objections of a lot of the locals, and an attempt to get the pub listed, the Clayton Arms is to be gutted and totally changed. There will be a single-storey extension and the internal layout changed.

#### **STONE**

The plans to demolish the County Arms and turn it into houses has been turned down by the council.

### Swan Supping

### TEN YEARS ON

At this time of year everyone seems to be looking back over the last year, decade, century or even millennium. I decided to examine the local pub and beer scene ten years ago and compare it with the present.

Using the Good Beer Guide as a basis for my research I compared the 1990 and 2000 editions for our local area.

The first thing that struck me was that six pubs have appeared in both editions, quite a high proportion of our total allocation of 31 pubs.

These are:

Prince Albert at Frieth

Stag & Huntsman at Hambleden

Swan at Stewkley

Swan Hotel at Thame

Five Elms at Weedon

General Havelock, Wycombe Marsh.

Of course, not all have appeared continuously but the Prince Albert has been in the guide 26 times (maximum possible 27) under various landlords and the Swan at Stewkley 17 times in succession. This is a tremendous achievement for both pubs.

Special congratulations to Arch Grainger who has been at the Swan at Stewkley for over eleven years.

Next I compared the beers ten years apart.

Then the most popular beers were Brakspear Bitter (10 entries) and ABC Best Bitter (9 entries). Now the most popular beer is Fuller's London Pride (11

entries) and Brakspear Bitter (9 entries). In 1990 our pubs were dominated by national brewers Ind Coope (ABC, Benskins and Tetley) and Courage although this was not reflected in the latter case by Good Beer Guide entries.

Nowadays we are dominated by pub retail groups (as opposed to brewers) in many cases selling beers that were once only available in the tied trade.

In 1990 we only had one micro brewer, Chiltern (much more widely available then), but now we have another four: Old Luxters, Rebellion, Sam Trueman and Vale. Mild has never been very popular in our area, six entries in 1990, three now.

The biggest change in the last ten years has been the opening up of the guest beer market.

The 1990 guide did not mention guest beers although they did exist. The difference was that they were stocked on a more permanent basis, for example many ABC pubs stocked Bass, Everard Tiger or Chiltern Beechwood then.

Nowadays nearly every pub offers a so called guest beer, frequently changing, even breweries that are not obliged to do so by law.

On the whole, we now can choose from a far greater range of beer although many pubs do not have a truly free choice of the guests they can stock and micro brewers complain how difficult it is to sell their beer to anything other than genuine free houses.

Yes, despite all the problems of beer supply, we do have more choice now. In 1990 nearly half our *Good Beer Guide* pubs only sold one or two real ales each.

# Regional Pub of the Year

The Royal Oak at Wantage in Oxfordshire has been chosen as Regional Pub of the Year for CAMRA's Central Southern Region. This region covers the whole of Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire, and also a small part of Hertfordshire (around Tring & Hemel Hempstead).

The Royal Oak received its award at a presentation on 10th November. The latest Good Beer Guide says "a warm welcome is guaranteed at this justly popular, lively free house, the discerning drinker's paradise".

There is always a good range of guest beers as well as regulars from Bass, Wadworth and West Berkshire. A word of warning however, the pub is closed at lunchtime from Monday to Thursday.

Runners up to the Royal Oak were the Hop Leaf at Reading and the Cock at Wing.

The Royal Oak now enters the final stage of judging against 15 other regions to find an overall national *Pub of the Year*. The result will be announced next April.

During a recent London pubcrawl of the Aylesbury Vale and Wycombe Branch it was pointed out that it was easier to get to many parts of London, from Aylesbury and Wycombe, than to many parts of the branch's area let alone the rest of Bucks.

As most of us know there are many excellent pubs in the county's hinterland but often no way to reach them apart from by taxi, which can be expensive, or private motor vehicle with the inherent problems of finding a driver prepared to drink coke or tomato juice all evening.

Realistically I appreciate that a half-hourly bus service to every village, up until midnight, passing isolated rural pubs en route, may not always be viable.

However I would hope that those in positions of influence including our MEP, MPs and Councillors are aware of this problem and more importantly are doing something about it.

Rural communities need rural pubs (as well as schools, post offices shops etc) as they can be a centre of village life. Rural pubs need viable transport links for locals and visitors alike.

I hope that the new millennium will see an improvement in transport links to our villages and that rural pubs will thrive.

This 5% ABV mid-brown brew is called Old Luxters Christmas Ale and is available in 33cl bottles @ £1.60 each.

Another new bottled beer is the 5% ABV strong dark ale called Diplomats Privilege. This was produced for International Diplomatic Suppliers, who deliver to diplomatic missions all over the world.

There is a special Christmas offer available on carryout beer sales. Available seven days a week from the brewery shop will be beer from £1 per pint. If you are

unsure which are to your taste, you can try before you buy.

Work on the new cellar shop is nearing completion. This change will increase the available sales area by four times.

#### REBELLION

The open day in October was a great success. Over 3500 people visited during the two days and their may be other open days in the future.

The work on the brewery is still continuing with extra tanks due to arrive in the near future.

The Christmas brew, Roasted Nuts is now available. This is a 4.6% nutty flavour.

A special beer for the Millennium has also been produced. This is a pale beer made with Cascade hops called Rebellion Bug. The strength is 4.8% ABV and it is described as being 'deceptively strong'.

If these are not enough, there will be another new beer (4.6% ABV) in the new year called Hangover from Hell!.


### VALE

The sixth Vale of Aylesbury festival, held beer conjunction with the Friends of Florence Nightingale House, was a great success.

The official opening was carried out by the mayor of Aylesbury, Chester Jones, as he pulled the first pint.

For the first time, the festival was held at the Mandeville. This larger venue allowed us to offer even more beer and cider than ever before.

There were 32 cask ales, five ciders and a perry. The first beer to run out on the Saturday night was the winner of the CAMRA Beer of the Year 1999 award, Timothy Taylor Landlord, shortly followed by the cask lager Harviestoun Schiehallion.

At closing time, however, there was plenty of beer remaining and a lot of customers were pleased to take advantage of the two and four pint carryout containers available.

Despite the rain, which was persistent throughout the weekend, the event managed to raise over £1700 for the Friends.



# Rebellion Brewery Trip 5th October 1999

The Rebellion Brewery at Marlow Bottom (founded 1993) recently moved half a mile from their cramped industrial estate premises to buildings on a farm which they have meticulously converted for micro brewery use.

This move has increased brewing capacity from 50 to over 200 barrels a week by also purchasing the development plant from Courage of Reading. In addition, the new equipment allows them to produce a wider range of beer styles.

Tim Coombes, one of the founders of Rebellion, gave us the tour with an informative and exhaustive account of how they converted old farm buildings to accommodate brewing equipment,

their various in-house processes, and the current state of the brewing industry.

Some technical brewing chemistry was also thrown in to confuse the majority!

One staggering fact to emerge was just how much duty is paid to H. M. Government. The Rebellion brewery pays the Exchequer nearly £20,000 per month. However, Courage pays £1 million per day and that is just one brewery (sorry - was one brewery (now closed by Scottish Courage) R. I. P.).

Beer sampling was continuous throughout the evening with *IPA*, *Blonde Bombshell* (a light summer drink), *Red October* and *Old Trout* (a hefty winter ale).

Food was provided by the Brewery Liaison Officer, John Williamson, who celebrated his fiftieth birthday the following day!

# Recent CAMRA publications reviewed



### Berkshire Pub Guide (6th edition)

(Edited by Colin Lanham, pages – Berkshire branches of CAMRA £4.95)

This new guide has to be one of the best local CAMRA county guides I have seen.

It is an extremely professional publication and it succeeds by the subtlety of its design. The handy narrow pocket-size format contains an abundance of information.

Some readers may consider the typeface somewhat small, but the pages have been designed for maximum clarity by the use of tasteful typography. Credit for this goes to Sophie Watson, a student in Typography and Graphic Communication at the University of Reading.

There are no photographs but the line drawings of pubs are very effective and there are also well drawn town and county maps.

Enough about the design, what about the content? I don't know many Berkshire pubs but I've checked a few descriptions and they seem to be very fair.

All pubs are listed, even those which don't sell real ale. Every real ale pub receives a full description and the best are classed as 'recommended' – these should offer excellent beer and service.

Only this last category includes a full list of facilities using the standard CAMRA symbols. It can't have been easy for the editors to have decided which pubs should receive the 'recommended' accolade. Pubs which don't come up to this standard seem to receive a fairly evenhanded description nevertheless.

About a quarter of the book contains some well written the brewing pieces on industry nationally as well at county level, beer styles, beer listings, methods of serving and details about beer CAMRA. Updates can be obtained from an e-mail address.

And, almost unique in local CAMRA guides, there is an element of humour.

Throughout the text, odd spaces have been filled up with little beery or boozy quotations from the likes of Oscar Wilde, William Shakespeare, W.C. Fields, Lord Byron and Dean Martin.

I like this one: 'A fine beer may be judged with just one sip, but it is better to be thoroughly sure (Anon).

# Fifty Great Pub Crawls

# by Barrie Pepper

(192 pages (56 in colour) CAMRA Books £8.99)

This could be a really useful book that may lure you to parts of Britain you don't often reach.

There are plenty of obvious Manchester, selections: Newcastle, Norwich, Bristol etc, but there are also a few unlikely towns for a good crawl such as Ledbury or Kington (that's in Herefordshire by the way).

Most of the crawls are intended to be done foot and many of them, sensibly, start and finish at a train or bus station.

There are some more unconventional crawls, e.g. Leeds to Manchester by rail, the Severn Valley by steam train and the Lee Valley by boat.

Barrie Pepper has compiled an excellent book with plenty of interesting history about the featured towns. Lots of photographs are included throughout and the last 56 pages feature town maps and a selection of pub photos, both in full colour. Each crawl covers about eight pubs and every one is described along with its probable beer range.

The Oxford crawl covers the following pubs: Three Goats Heads, White Horse, Kings Arms, Turf Tavern, The Bear, Wheatsheaf, Crown

and The Brewery Gate.

This is an ideal book to take on a weekend break. Get someone to give it to you for Christmas!





W&D to take over Mansfield Brewery

Drinkers in the East Midlands are preparing to step up the campaign to protect Mansfield's prized brewery and the beers it brews. The call to action follows the announcement that the sale of Mansfield Brewery to Wolverhampton and Dudley has now been agreed.

Following campaigning by local CAMRA members and the 'Save the Brewery' action group led by Alan Meale MP, W&D has pledged to keep the Mansfield Brewery open for at least two years while it completes a strategic review of its brewing business.

Mike Benner, Head of Campaigns and Communications said, "This take-over promises to offer shareholders a good deal, but the loss of Mansfield's independence is unlikely to offer When did you last see such a concerted benefits for consumers. It's a welcome ad campaign for one of their equivalent development that Wolves intends to keep brewing at Mansfield for at least two years and CAMRA will be pushing for them to keep the brewery open long-




